Super Saturday Event Supports Rise Against Hunger

On Saturday, Jan. 21, White's Chapel will once again team up with Rise Against Hunger to package 30,000 meals to help in the fight to stop hunger. The semi-annual event is one that encourages families—especially those with young children—to serve together in a worthwhile, easily-explained and identifiable mission.

Meal-packing events, such as the one planned at WC this month, are staged to

create fortified, dehydrated, shelf-stable meals that are transported to areas identified as being food insecure. Rise Against Hunger has worked to serve 78 countries packaging over 543 million meals. In 2020 alone, the organization impacted 2.8 million lives. The organization has five international locations in Italy, India, Malaysia,

Philippines, and South Africa. These locations connect passionate volunteers with

Kenya, Liberia, Madagascar, Malawi, Mali, Nicaragua, Niger, Philippines, Senegal,

Sierra-Leone, Somalia, South Africa, South Sudan, Uganda, Ukraine, Vietnam, and Zimbabwe.

They may look like simple bags of rice and soy, but the Rise Against Hunger meals represent the hopes and dreams of people worldwide, as well as a growing

global movement to end hunger by empowering communities, nourishing lives, and responding to emergencies. Volunteers who assemble the bags are the heart of the mission to end hunger, and the millions of meals sent around the globe each year cannot be distributed without these volunteers.

This ministry is the recipient of one of the communion offerings each year, typically in July. All of

An Open House for Chapel Hill Children's School will be held next Sunday, Jan. 22, from 2 to 4 p.m. according to Marna Parker, CHCS director.

Registration for the 2023-2024 school year of Chapel Hill Children's School will begin for current students the week of Jan. 23. Registration for siblings of current students begins Jan. 30.

Members of White's Chapel and Chapel Hill alumni families will be given an early

registration option on Tuesday, Feb. 7 beginning at 9:30 a.m. in Grace Chapel. Church membership must be effective by Jan. 1, 2023.



Registration will open to the public the following Saturday, Feb. 25 at 9 a.m. All registration is in person. No online registration is available. Registering students must be 18 months old on or before Sept. 1 of 2023.

There are numerous classes available for each age group. Classes are grouped by age as well as weekly schedule. Two-day classes are offered on Monday and Wednesday, as well as Tuesday and Thursday. Limited classes are also offered for three days with a Monday, Wednesday and Friday format.

"Siblings and all of our current students are given first priority," explained Parker,

Cooking with Care:

Leaders Needed for New Season

White's Chapel is looking for a leader or group of leaders who can share the responsibilities for this year's Cooking

with Care ministry efforts at the Ronald McDonald House (RMDH) in Fort Worth.

Cooking with Care is a White's Chapel volunteer-run ministry that prepares and serves meals to families staying at the RMDH. Each month, men and women from the church join in planning, buying, preparing, and serving lunch to family members of the patients at Cook Children's Medical Center. Meals are served twice a month, on the second and third Monday. Volunteers meet at the church and carpool together. All meals are prepared in the RMDH kitchen.

The Ronald McDonald House is a place where families who travel far from home spend several weeks or months while their seriously-ill children undergo treatment. According to their website, "The Ronald McDonald house of Fort Worth is a 'home-away-from-home' for families so they can stay close by their hospitalized child at little or no cost." The caring and comfortable atmosphere helps families share love and offer emotional support to other families experiencing similar situations. Those at the RMDH understand that helping a sick child fight an illness can take a toll on a family, and they offer support in many ways.

"The moment I walk into Ronald McDonald House, I'm filled with gratitude," shared Cooking with Care volunteer Leigh Lynde. "Gratitude that my family has never needed to access such a facility and gratitude that such a facility exists for those families that do."

The organization prides itself on being 'more than a place to stay,' offering a house for families to stay in, a family

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the communion money collected for this mission is used to purchase the materials for the bags.

The United Methodist Church recently surpassed an incredible milestone by packaging over 100 million of those meals. White's Chapel was a huge part of that effort.

"This is one of the most popular volunteer events we do," explained Kim Stinson. "Because of this, we have been able to increase the number of meals we have packaged in the past from 20,000 to our current 30,000. Part of the popularity, in addition to being a great cause, is that this event allows entire families to work together for a cause that is easily explained to children."

As a result of the increase in packaged meals, an increase in volunteers has also

become a factor. The need has risen from 100 volunteers to 150.

Setup volunteers will meet at 8 a.m. in Evans Hall to help unload the supplies from trucks and set up packing stations. Starting at 9 a.m., volunteers will actively participate in the fight against hunger by measuring and packaging meals for those in need. Approximately 30,000 meals will be packaged and shipped globally just from this one day of service.

Registration for this Super Saturday event is available on the church website, but it is filling up quickly. Another packing event with Rise Against Hunger will be available in July. Children four years old and older are welcome to help their parents serve. All participants must wear closed-toed shoes.

room at Cook Children's Medical Center, a day program for families not currently staying at the house, and a hospital cart for visitors to utilize while with a patient.

"Walking into the Ronald McDonald House brings me such joy," said Cooking with Care volunteer Ann Ryder. "We are greeted warmly by the staff, who frequently share with us how much the residents enjoy our meals. During each visit, we serve around 55 healthful meals to families who are far from home and are blessed to have them share their stories with us and ask us to pray for their children. It is my hope that they realize there are people around them who want to help them on their journey, no matter how small the contribution."

Cooking with Care is currently in need of a leader (or a team of leaders) to organize and plan meals while coordinating with volunteers to support those at the RMDH. Anyone with a heart for service is welcome to get involved.

Susan Gregg, the dedicated volunteer who led this effort in the past, recently shared her thoughts on the heartfelt ministry and its need for new participants.

"Parents who are staying at Ronald McDonald house are going through the

most terrible nightmare a parent can experience," she said. "Their child may have just been diagnosed with cancer, or may need surgery or ongoing treatment... The last thing they need to think about is preparing meals or having to spend money on eating out. When we prepare lunch for these parents, we are showing God's love for them and, hopefully, lessening one burden. We are a friendly ear if they want to talk. The parents we meet are always so appreciative... We have a team of loyal, experienced volunteers, but we need a leader or leaders to plan the menu, shop for the

ingredients, and supervise the preparation of lunch twice a month." Volunteers of the Cooking with Care ministry offer support, love and good food to families facing difficult

situations. If you are interested in leading the Cooking with Care team or participating in this meaningful ministry, please contact Dedra Moffatt at dmoffat@whiteschapel.org. All volunteers must be 16 years old or older, vaccinated for COVID-19 and the seasonal flu, and wear a mask.

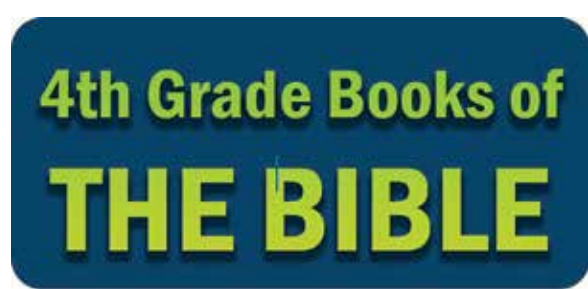

"but after that, our first priority becomes the White's Chapel membership."

Typically, there are enough spaces provided for what is needed. But each year has its own challenge.

"Obviously, if every church member shows up with two-year-olds those slots fill up quickly," she said. "Of course, we do start a wait list at that time. I will say that historically, anyone who gets on a waitlist during this registration process has gotten in. However, I cannot always guarantee that."

The school is always a popular destination for preschoolers in the area, and is licensed for 274 students. Each classroom is equipped with two teachers. Additionally, each class has at least one teacher with a specific kindergarten or transitional kindergarten degree. The teachers are required to complete 24 hours of continuing education per year as per state education requirement.

"These are teachers who are certified educators for the state of Texas," said Parker. "There are 48 employees here, so our staff is the size of an elementary

"I started at Chapel Hill in the 3-year-old class in 2009, after being in CISD for seven years. At Chapel Hill, I taught in both PDO & Preschool before taking the Operations position and then taking the Assistant Director job seven years ago."

Chapel Hill is one of the largest licensed private Christian preschools in the area, yet has the reputation of having a warm, welcoming atmosphere. The school requires its preschool (threes, fours, and TK) to have a certified teacher as a lead. That is not required at most other preschools, but that is the school's chosen model to provide kids with the best education. Additionally, every person on staff is certified in pediatric CPR and first aid, and has 24 hours of continuing education each year.

Enrollment at CHCS includes chapel, which meets once a week for each class.

"We start a regular curriculum for chapel each year, beginning with the Old Testament in the fall. The birth of Jesus is celebrated at Christmas and, in the spring, children learn about Jesus as a boy. At Easter, children are introduced to the Easter story," said Parker.

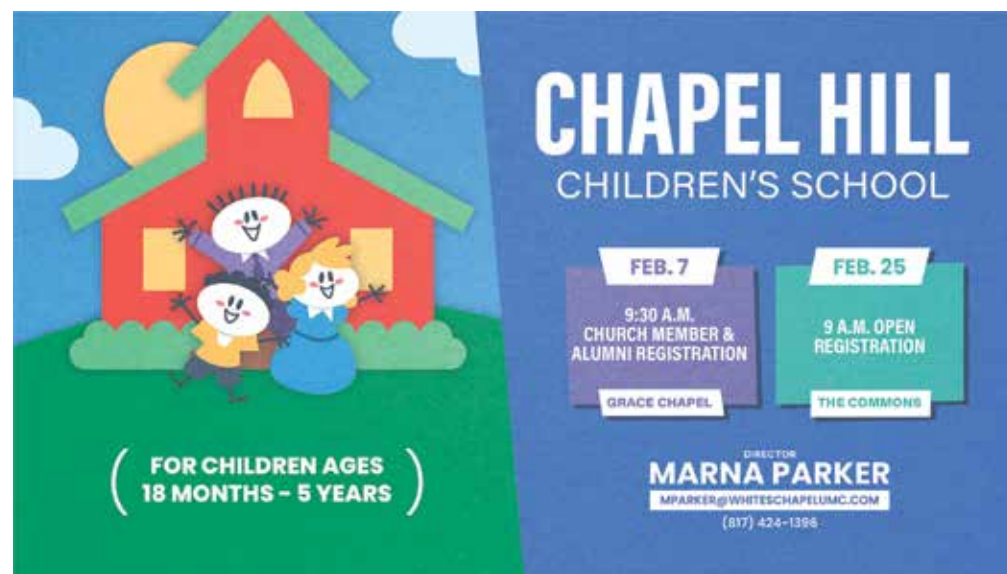
Chapel closes with songs and leadership opportunities for each child. Birthdays are also celebrated every

week.

"We have our rituals, you know, but the children do learn about structure, tradition and rules."

The program has advantages for parents as well.

"For our



school. We have very little staff turnover. When a teacher leaves, it is typically because of a family moving out of the area or retirement. Those who retire usually stay on staff as a substitute."

"I have to say our staff is amazing," added Parker. "They are the heart and soul of our school. They are here because they are passionate about the kids and providing a loving, nurturing environment to give them the best early education possible. Not only that, but they are so supportive of each other. The staff celebrates together through good times and prays and loves each other through life's challenges."

Parker has been the Director at Chapel Hill for seven years. She began with Chapel Hill in the first year of its operation as a teacher. She earned her administrator's credential in 2016 and became director that year. A native of North Carolina, she attended North Carolina State University.

"My own son was a student at CHCS, which has provided me perspective as a parent as well as a teacher and administrator," she said. "I have always had a passion for early education and my entire career has been in preschool."

Assistant Director Leslie Westerman has also been at CHCS for a number of years. Her passion for early education began in college.

"I graduated from TCU with a Speech & Pathology degree," said Westerman.

of very young children, the families haven't made friends with other people in that stage," she said. "This is a great place to meet people who are in that beginning phase of education with their children. With the children being grouped according to their age, they will typically be together for about the next three years. In many cases, the children will also be in Sunday School class together, so the families of those children also become friends. It's wonderful socialization for the children and the parents."

The school uses Carroll ISD as a guideline for setting their calendar, although, typically, there are a few more days off than the school district.

Fees are as follows:

- Two Days - \$300 registration fee and \$290 tuition per month
- Three Days - \$350 registration fee and \$340 tuition per month
- Four Days (Fours) - \$500 registration and \$495 tuition per month
- Four Days (TK) - \$500 registration and \$550 tuition per month

and retreat, our confirmands will learn that the church is a place for them - full of fun, life-long relationships, and most importantly, a place where they can encounter Jesus!"

Throughout each week, students will do a deep-dive into topics like the Bible, salvation, and what it means to be the church. Students will meet in small groups - a time and space to think through what was discussed, ask questions, and make new connections that are personal to them. These groups of students will stay together throughout the whole semester, and they become the place where a student can be known personally, be encouraged, and make relationships that can last a lifetime.

The upcoming semester will also include a Confirmation retreat - a one-day adventure for the students to get to know their peers, have some fun, and experience a worship service created just for them.
