# Volunteers Return to Costa Rica After Two Year COVID Hiatus

hirty-seven missionaries representing White's Chapel were commissioned and blessed in the 11 a.m. service this past Sunday. The missionaries left this week, travelling to Costa Rica in two different groups.

The trip marks the first international mission trip from White's Chapel since before COVID. Heather and Chris Rowley will join former team leaders Ken and Sharon Nelson this year.

Eighteen members left for the first week on Tuesday, Jan. 31 and will return Monday, Feb. 6. An additional 19 members leave for the second week on Friday, Feb. 3, returning Thursday, Feb. 9. Of this group of 37 members, it will be the first international mission trip for 22 people, with this being the very first adult mission trip for most of those. The trip will overlap a few days in the middle in order for all participants to worship and work together.

# Reading God's Word In A Way That Speaks To You

f you have wanted to start reading the Bible regularly this year, there is still time! The first step is to get a ■ translation that speaks to you. The idea of purchasing a Bible might seem like an easy concept but in actuality, it can be a huge undertaking if you don't know what you're looking for. Today, there seems to be many different types of Bibles in the market. In addition to different translations, Bibles seem to differ in their forms and added content. So how do you know what's right for you? Whether you are a teenager/ intermediate reader, or a seasoned reader, there is a type of Bible translation that can better assist you in your studies.

#### Spending time in God's Word helps us better understand who He is...

Step 1: Pick A Translation Method A translation is defined as, "a rendering of the Bible in a language different than the one in which it was written. A translation is intended to be as literal as possible and still be easily read" (Bible.org). Because the Bible wasn't originally written in English, most modern Bibles have been translated from the original text, first written in Hebrew or Greek. Over the centuries, there have been three different methods used to translate the Bible: literal translation, dynamic equivalent translation and free translation. Literal translation attempts to use the exact words and phrases that were originally used. This is also called word-for-word translation. Dynamic equivalent and free translation

# Bible Structure and Organization Taught in New Sunday Curriculum

t's a natural progression.

Each fall, White's Chapel third graders receive personal Bibles as a rite of passage, celebrating the idea that at this age they can actually read it for themselves.

Now, our WC Kids department has adapted a curriculum for fourth graders that teaches the structure and organization of the Bible. "We noticed that many kids were struggling to navigate the Bible efficiently and independently," said Alyson Bator, WC Kids Curriculum/Thrive Coordinator. "We wanted to create a class that would not only help the kids become more familiar with the books of the Bible, but also provide them with a deeper understanding of what each book is about."

The overarching goal, she says, is that by the end of the semester, kids will be able to recite the books of the Bible in order from Genesis to Revelation.

"We chose fourth grade students because we want to ensure that we are teaching the skills that will help them feel comfortable and achieve familiarity in navigating the Bible independently."

Greek and Roman actors would wear large masks and costumes designed to increase the size of their appearance. They would wear platform shoes to make themselves look taller. They did everything they could to make themselves appear to be something that they really were not. They projected an image or an emotion that seemed to be real, but in reality, was false.


The word hypocrite soon took on the connotation of someone who treated the world as a stage, on which they were playing a part. They tried to make themselves appear to be something



interprets ideas from the original text with a more modern take on grammar or ideas. Dynamic equivalent translation is expressed through thought-forthought ideas that are expressed within the text. It uses the same words but changes the word order or grammar to better fit the second language. Free translation expresses the text through paraphrased ideas. This type is more of an interpretation of the original text and can be referred to as paraphrased Bibles.

So which version is better? It depends what type of studying one is conducting. If an individual were trying to understand the original text, a wordfor-word translation would be a better fit. If someone might have difficultly understanding the language used in word-for-word translation, he or she may benefit from reading a thoughtfor-thought translation. This would still hold the same meaning as the first type of translated method but it would be presented in a way that is similar to modern language structure and phrasing. Paraphrased translations, while having a similar modern language structure as thought-for-thought translations has a loose interpretation of the original text. While it can be one of the easiest forms to read, its ideas are largely dependent on the thoughts and ideas of the translator and may not be a good fit for someone who is trying to establish doctrine. Its poetic and story-like qualities may make it a good study Bible but not necessarily a good source for accurately depicting the meaning of the text.

#### Step 2: Choose A Version Within Your **Preferred Translation**

#### Adult Versions

There are many different types of versions within a preferred method of translation. Even though all versions have some shortcomings in comparison of the original scripture, some people have preferences of a Bible written closer to literal translation over dynamic translation. Of Bibles with a more of a word-by-word translation, the New American Standard Bible (NASB), the King James Version (KJV), the New King James Version (NKJV), the Revised Standard Version (RSV), the New Revised Standard Version (NRSV) are some of the most popular versions. Other versions, such as the New Living Translation (NLT), the Living Bible or The Message, are more thought-for-thought versions of the text. This means that the same

Scripture compared between the NASB and The Message will read differently. The Common English Bible is also used to better understand the text in words and phrases that are common in today's society. Each version of Bible is unique and can be used for different studying purposes.

#### Teen Bibles

Teenagers are at a very impressionable age and can benefit from the many different study tools that are often included in their Bibles. As a young person, it is important that the individual is able to understand some of the deeper ideas of faith. Bibles directed at teenagers might still paraphrase the original text but often times, Bibles for this age group are directly focused to better improve their understanding of God and His character. Popular teen study Bibles include versions of New International Version (NIV), NLT and KJV. Many of these Bibles also have additional pages of notes and verses to help the reader through common teen issues.

#### Children's Bibles

Many different versions of children's Bibles will not be directly translated word-for-word from the original text. Because of their young age, children are more receptive to the stories within the Bible so many of the popular translations fall somewhere in the middle between direct translations and dynamic translations. When choosing a Bible for a child, it is important to make sure the Bible is God-focused, grace-centered and full of good written and visual elements. The New International Version (NIV) is one of the many great options for children to read. This version is a great stepping-stone to a teen or adult Bible. It reads at a third grade level.

While there are many different versions of the Bible and methods of better understanding the scripture, there is no 'wrong way' to try to read the Word of God. To examine some of the different versions of the Bible, feel free to visit the White's Chapel bookstore, Circuit Writers Books & Such, or another local community bookstore.

Hebrews 4:12 states, "For the word of God is alive and active. Sharper than any double-edged sword, it penetrates even to dividing soul and spirit, joints and marrow; it judges the thoughts and attitudes of the heart." God is amazing and He loves us. Spending time in God's Word helps us better understand who He is, and there's no better time to learn than now.

For those that seek the Lord with all their heart will find Him (Jeremiah 29:13).

Methodist missionary who was working at The Evangelical Methodist Seminary of Costa Rica. After helping build casitas on the university campus, the WC team searched for another project that specifically involved working with children. Wright set up a tour of the Roblealto campus. Roblealto has four daycare facilities throughout San Jose, but it was the main Roblealto Bible Home that became the focus of the ensuing mission trips.

The Roblealto Child Care Association is a Christian, public welfare, nonprofit organization that was founded in 1932. Since its inception, the program's mission has been to care for the children of Costa Rica who are in critical situations and in need of specialized care and integrated services in order to reach their full potential. Thousands of children have received comprehensive care in the areas of health, nutrition, education, and spiritual and emotional support. The children's parents, who may be incarcerated or victimized by poverty or abuse, receive support from Roblealto's interdisciplinary team in order to stop the cycles of poverty and dysfunction within one generation.

The campus includes a school, an activity center, and numerous homes in which house parents live with approximately ten children who have come from high-risk home situations. These facilities have been the focus of White's Chapel mission teams since 2014. Prior to 2020, the trips were scheduled annually. Smith described the upcoming work consisting of light

construction and painting at the campus of Roblealto.

Sharon Nelson, along with husband Ken, has led the Costa Rica trip each year since the beginning. She stated that the Roblealto Bible Home is supported financially in three ways: by the government, by the campus egg farm and by individual sponsorships.

"When you sponsor a child, it helps with their daily needs, but it does so much more in that it gives you that relationship connection," she explained. "What child doesn't love to have a special friend and getting special letters to just them?"

Nelson recalled a particular situation when one of the White's Chapel missionaries found that special child to

"One year at our pizza party night, Jane Duft sat with a little boy and they had a great connection," she said. "At the end of the evening he asked her to sponsor him. Well, with all the kids there, she forgot to get his name. Now, how was she supposed to sponsor him? The next day, Jane and her husband Rich were walking up the hill and who comes walking down but Nathan, the boy she had connected with. It was a God thing. They had a great loving relationship for two years until Nathan finally went home to his family."

Smith is especially excited about "the opportunity to build relationships with the children, the staff, and with each other." He continued by saying "God created us to be in community, and we are blessed to be able to do this while serving those in need. Everyone I know who has been to Roblealto affirms that this particular mission is life changing. We are so grateful for the generosity of White's Chapel and our many sponsoring volunteers who make this trip possible!"

The progression of students at White's Chapel is to move into Club 56, a spiritual and activity-based program for fifth and sixth graders, and then into WC Students, the church's middle and high school programs. All of these programs challenge students to dig deeper into the Bible.

"We want to provide them with the skills, so they are ready to meet the standard of other programs head on," Bator added.

Class leaders use games, skits, and many other activities each week to make

learning the books of the Bible fun. A guiding force in the class is a song by Jesus Said Kids, called "These are the Books of The Bible." Students listen to the song each week to help with memorization of Biblical chronology.

Students also receive a books of the Bible card set. Each week, they are given the cards that were studied and discussed that week in class and are then tasked with memorizing those few that week. On the back of each card, there is information about the author, theme, and main stories in that specific book of the Bible. By the end of the

class, they will have all 66 books of the Bible.

The base model for this class is a curriculum called Teaching Kids The Books of The Bible—12 Week Children's Ministry Curriculum. Bator is taking the lessons provided and modifying and adjusting them to meet the specific needs of our church family.

The class will end April 23. It is in a small group format and takes place at

both the 9:30 and 11 a.m. services. All fourth-grade students who come to Sunday School attend this class.

"This class is formatted in a way that is very similar to the regular Sunday School classes," said Bator. "We will start a skit and then begin

diving into Scripture. As they discuss Scripture, kids will engage in discussion and work through difficult questions. We are structuring the class so the kids feel comfortable with each other and will feel comfortable digging into the Bible in a way they haven't before."

A video performance of the fourth graders singing the "Books of the Bible" will show on April 30 in the Sanctuary. All participants in the fourth Grade Books of the Bible class will be invited to Urban Air following the 11 a.m. service to celebrate.

the God and Country program. They also have the opportunity to earn PRAY awards, a program for boys and girls in first through 12th grades that walks them through basic Christian beliefs.

Our connection with scouting ministries is possible because of the Office of Civic Youth-Serving Agencies underneath the United Methodist Men's Foundation. The men's group recognizes that when our doors are open for scouting ministries, there is an opportunity for evangelism, discipleship and the molding of servant leaders, as both the Girl Scout Promise and Boy Scout Oath include the promise to "help people at all times."

The Methodist Church has a long history of sponsoring troops, groups and clubs that include Boy Scouts, Girls Scouts, Big Brothers Big Sisters and Campfire.

These youth-serving agencies offer an opportunity for outreach within the communities where our churches are located.

The programs aim to build up children and young people who are honest, fair, caring, helpful, loyal, courageous, kind, obedient, brave and strong. Not only are these the hallmarks of a good scout, they also are the marks of a good disciple. There also are programs within the scouting ministries that encourage children and young people to explore what they believe and how to put those beliefs into practice alongside a pastor from a local congregation.

The men's group encourages and equips churches to continue entering into this intentional partnership because of the value of this unique outreach opportunity to be in ministry with children and youth, many of whom are not connected to a church home.
