

Backwards (sdrawkcab) Day

t's a strange thing to recognize nationally, isn't it? But each year, it's on the calendar and it's recognized on January 31.

According to National Today, Backwards Day was initially created by two women while working on a farm. In the midst of tending to typical chores around the property, their minds wandered to creative and silly things. What if people did things the opposite way they usually do them? What if people did things 'backwards'? Probably with some laughter involved, the pair spread the word about their ideal 'backwards day' and on Jan. 31, their whole community was doing things 'backwards' along with them. That was in 1961.

The idea wasn't necessarily new, though. In the 15th century, the



Willson's first play was inspired by his boyhood in Mason City, lowa, and incorporated many characters from personal friends, acquaintances, and observations. "The Music Man" became an instant Broadway hit in 1957, winning five Tony awards, including Best Musical. It was made into a movie in 1962, starring Robert Preston and Shirley Jones. The soundtrack is captivating and timeless (with a capital T, and that rhymes with P and that stands for "pool") with lyrics that have become a part of the American vernacular.

The play is frequently produced by both professional and amateur theater companies and is a popular choice for high school and college productions.

Performing Arts is not entirely new at White's Chapel. Enthusiasm for theater has long been a cornerstone of Arts Academy, a WC Kids program, with now two separate Theater programs presenting about five plays per year.

"The generated interest in children's theater, as well as limited opportunities for local community theater, created a dream for doing a family program that includes all ages," said Rawls. He admits that while the children's productions are abridged, they have "set the bar very high."

"It's time for the parents and grandparents to have a turn at the fun," he said. While the two major roles of Harold Hill and Marian Paroo have already been cast, the musical includes a wealth of character actors for adults, as well as two for teens and two for elementary age children. A barbershop quartet and ladies group create side interest. Townspeople will be needed in all age groups.

For those interested in participating behind the scenes, there will be opportunities for crew members that will include needs for props and costumes.

"There's a place for everyone who wants to participate," said Rawls, "whether they're on the stage or backstage. We want church and community to feel welcome to join in. The actual sets will be projections in the sanctuary that we're standing in front of. We are also working on some surprises involving community groups. I think it's going to be wonderful!!"

The registration link for auditions is available by scanning the QR code above. Interested candidates should prepare a five to seven-minute reading that showcases talents, and those preparing for a role featuring a solo or ensemble should be prepared to sing a musical selection of auditioner choice. Auditions will be from 1 to 5 p.m. both days.

The production is scheduled for April 24 & 25. Admission will be free.



world's most well-known Italian artist, mathematician, inventor, and writer, did a few things in reverse as well. Leonardo da Vinci practiced mirror writing, starting from the right side of the paper and moving to the left as he wrote. When put in front of a mirror, the message would read clearly but if not, one would have

a difficult time understanding what was written. While many have guessed his purpose in writing this way, no one truly knows why he did it. Some speculate that he

was protecting his ideas from those who would want to steal them, and others say it was to prevent smudging of ink because he wrote left-handed.

Whether out of necessity or out of imaginative fun, we all tend to do things that may seem a little 'backwards' to others. Adding certain toppings or sauces to pizza (pineapple vs no pineapple, ranch vs no ranch)... or the way to open a wrapped gift or letter (rip vs no rip). To many outside of the United States, even the way we write the date is a little strange (month-day-year vs daymonth-year).

Perhaps, we need to embrace the 'backwards' way – thinking creatively and embracing moments of fun. But more importantly, maybe we need to rethink how we practice our faith in the same way – do we need to turn it on its head? Do we need to rethink how we approach it?

We may possibly need reminding that it's not our life to live as we please. It's

the life God gave us. What would it look like if we said, "I'm going to wake up and live for you, Lord. I will love more and be more intentional about caring for your people. My life is not my own, it's yours." The world would probably think that's a little 'backwards.' But that's the wonderful thing about our faith. We trust God to provide for our needs and sustain our joy.

Caring for or forgiving those who don't deserve it – to the world, that definitely seems a little 'backwards'... but our loving

Creator did that for us even when we rejected him. He continues to forgive us, too, each time we fall. Do we extend that same unexplainable grace with others?

If we took the indistinguishable message of our own lives and held it up to a mirror, what would it say? Would it convey a message of love, joy and hope in Jesus Christ or would it still be unclear? Let's not miss the wonderful opportunities we have to share God's love and joy with those around us this year. What if this Backwards Day, we all took time to think about our faith... what if we discovered we needed to approach it a different way?

Rawls is excited about this program as it offers the opportunity to "present [his] friend and colleague, Carl Tanner to our community. Carl is one of the world's greatest tenors and, since he is here, we will also have the opportunity for him to sing Sunday morning in church. It's our communion Sunday and he'll be doing the Lord's Prayer – and that will be amazing!"

Rawls is also excited to introduce Scott Ayers to the church community. A native of Greenville, South Carolina, Ayers has been a church musician since the age of 12 and has accompanied musical theater productions since his late teens. He has served churches in South Carolina, Oklahoma and Texas, as well as presenting keyboard concerts in more than a dozen states. He holds a degree in Music Theory and Composition from Oklahoma Baptist University and has done graduate work in Jazz, Theory and Composition at the University of South Carolina.


"Scott has produced four albums and has a number of published arrangements for choir, keyboard and orchestra," said Rawls. "He is the musical director for several local theaters as well as several schools in the Plano area."

In addition to these special quests, the audience will have the opportunity to hear from many in our White's Chapel music community.




