ur typical weekly services have multiple worship times and teams that lead across the church campus. While many of these leaders are visible on the chancel and other platforms, many others are behind soundboards, lightboards, and video booths. It takes a monumental effort to bring our all of worship services to life week after week.

With the lead up to Holy Week, this rises to a completely different level. Avoiding Grace/Getting Grace *"Guilt always hurries towards its complement: punishment; only there does its satisfaction lie." – Lawrence Durrell*

"Why would anyone avoid grace?" we may think. Why would anyone run from the tenderness and forgiveness and love of God? Why would anyone choose guilt? These questions are easier than their answers. For too many of us, we've grown up with a pervasive feeling that we never quite measure up. We've seen others catch on just a little before us; we've seen them succeed where we've failed; we've crossed life's finish lines just behind the rest of the pack. For others of us, we've pushed ourselves to be the best, to be first, to win at all cost.

In the first instance, we avoid grace because we don't think we deserve it. Grace stands as a reward for all those other people who are better than us.

The Truth of Jesus

have been greatly concerned when I hear Christian preachers and teachers proclaim a message that is contrary to the teaching of Jesus. I pray that the gospel is so ingrained in us that we can tell good teaching from that which is not so good.

As Jesus prepared to enter heaven and leave his followers behind to carry on the

mission, there was one abiding worry on his mind: that they would follow false teachers and stray from the truth of His gospel. In the great sermon, he issued an intense warning: "Beware of false prophets, who come to you in sheep's clothing but inwardly

are ravenous wolves." (Matthew 7:15)

False prophets never advertise themselves as false prophets; they're too smart for that. Like a counterfeit dollar they try to pass themselves off as the real thing. In Jesus' day shepherds wore the wool of the sheep as clothing. These false prophets deceive, not by impersonating the sheep, but by impersonating the shepherd.

A false prophet will speak just enough truth to camouflage their lies. Henry Ward Beecher, the great preacher of the 19th century, once said, "whatever is only almost true, is quite false, and among the most dangerous of errors because being

so near truth, it is the more likely to lead astray."

That's why Jesus said, "Beware." The word literally means "to pay close attention to." We do not need to be deceived by the number of books an author sells, or the size of the congregation that gathers for the teaching. We need to hold what we

> hear up to the Truth of Jesus. Even more, we need to always apply Jesus' test. He said, "you will know them by their fruits." (Matthew 7:16)

Does the fruit of the teacher lead to love, forgiveness and kindness? Does it lead others to love their

brothers and sisters, and be concerned about the lost and the least around us? Does the teaching call us to "take up a cross" and give our lives in service to others?



meeting regularly to rehearse. In fact, the sanctuary choir adds a Sunday night rehearsal specifically for Holy Week in addition to their normal Wednesday night choir practice!

Holy Week Services include Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, and Easter. Holy Week choir rehearsals are Sunday nights at 5 p.m. Feb. 18 – March 17. A Sunday afternoon rehearsal is added on March 24 from 12:30 to 2 p.m. for Maundy Thursday, as well as a Maundy Thursday dress rehearsal on Wednesday, March 27 at 6:30 p.m. A final rehearsal for Easter is on Saturday, March 30 at 9 a.m.

Dozens of productions and audiovisual experts are beginning to generate content and install technology that will be used during that very special week.

"All are welcome to join our Holy Week Choir and may pick up a music packet at any rehearsal," said Clint Blalock, White's Chapel Worship Co-Director. "The music is also available online for those who would like to listen and rehearse outside of our rehearsals."

Oftentimes, volunteers join the choir for holiday seasons, and that is a wonderful part of the celebrations and observances.

"The choir is a lot like the church," said Blalock. "We are greater than the sum of our parts.

Each person brings their own unique talents and abilities to the group. The result is something that demonstrates the power of God in a way that gives God all the credit! There is no requirement to audition, to read music, or to have any experience singing with a choir. The musical skills can be learned by almost anyone, and the most important parts of being in the choir aren't contained on any page of music. A heart that desires to praise God and share God's love with others through music are all that's required."

Lessons

The group will be working on exciting new music for several of our Holy Week services. Maundy Thursday will feature multiple selections from a new collection by Elaine Hagenberg entitled "Illiminaire."

"We will introduce a new Easter anthem by renowned arranger and friend of WC, Dan Forrest," continued Blalock. "And as always we will include several beloved songs that are requested year after year, such as "Lord, Have Mercy," "Sound of Silence," and many others."

"We also have a few songs that show up every year for our Easter traditional services," said Blalock. "We will always sing 'Christ the Lord Is Risen Today' by Charles Wesley, one of the founders of the Methodist Church. The traditional services also end. with 'The Hallelujah Chorus' and 'Oh Happy Day,' two songs that are beloved by our congregation."

Blalock adds that worship will feature the song, "The Blessing" in several places leading up to Easter this year. "We are excited to introduce a new symphonic version that will bring the Lenten sermon series together beautifully on Easter."

This year's Lenten sermon series will dive deeply into the Priestly Blessing from the book of Numbers, chapter 6.

Prior to joining White's Chapel, Blalock's religious background did not include the practice of Lent.

"Many who are new to our church have come from a faith tradition that may not have included Lenten observance," he said. "In many ways, every Sunday is a little Easter, and that's a wonderful way to celebrate our faith together in worship. Those who are willing to lean into the season of Lent that leads up to Holy Week, can expect this season of reflection, repentance, and recommitment to yield a deeper, more meaningful experience of their faith. Beginning with Ash Wednesday as observed this week, then delving into the Lenten devotional readings, the weekend worship services, and special Holy Week services - all of these contribute to a life-changing, faith-building season that supports following Christ more deeply year-round."

unclaimed. We have taken that powerful image of Jesus' love for humanity and turned it into a theological formula for salvation. We have argued, debated, and criticized others who differ from our thoughts with an un-grace that is chilling. And tragically, too many who seek to follow Jesus Christ have never really gotten it. John Newton captured our quandary in his great hymn "Amazing Grace," when he wrote that grace leads us into this sense of awe and wonder about God and then relieved our greatest doubts with a sense of Presence and Love that calms our fears. We move into this wonderful relationship when we choose to believe in Jesus Christ. When you and I really get grace, we start to understand the paradoxes of life. It has been said that justice is when we get what we deserve, that mercy is when we don't get what we do deserve, and that grace is when we get what we don't deserve. That doesn't make sense to our basic understanding of life. We want cause and effect. We instinctively want life to be fair. But grace says that life is basically not fair. We who are sinners are brought before the judge only to be found not guilty – not for what we have done, but because of what Christ has done for us. Romans 5:8 puts it this way: "But God proves his love for us in that while we still were sinners Christ died for us." When we get that, our fears start to get relieved. When we get that, we start to find a new way of looking at life - one that moves from judgment to acceptance, one that makes peace with not having easy answers. When we get that, we start to own the mystery and limits of our knowledge. When we really get grace, what we find is that peace of God that passes all understanding.



In Jesus' time, was parking at the mercy of Joey's good food and fellowship as it is today? What was the parking situation at the Temple during Jesus' time on any given Sabbath?

where they parked the donkeys, camels, and white SUVs at the Temple. Every Sunday, a few of us do our best to help everyone get into service as guickly as possible. Grace is for those "super Christians" who love selflessly and faithfully serve; it's for those who read their Bibles and pray every day. Grace is not for people like us. Grace is not for those of us who have failed in every way that a person can fail. It's not for those of us who mess up and falter. Instead, we endure the punishment of a tortured and lonely soul because we believe that is what we deserve for what we've done and what's been done to us.

In the other case, grace is shirked because we think that we must earn it. Maybe it is that we don't think that we can trust in something that comes so readily and without strings. We need to work for our redemption. We will suffer the punishment of guilty consciences and the pain of sleepless nights to prove ourselves worthy of the love of God. We avoid the promises of grace because it's too good to believe. We avoid them because we need to prove the unprovable to the Almighty: that we're worthy of his love, that we merit his grace.

On both sides of this same coin, grace stands as a bold affront to the ways that we see ourselves. We can think that we need to work for grace or we can think that no matter how hard we do work, grace will elude us; but in either case, grace that is grace comes to all equally regardless of our abilities. It is not our goodness that invites grace; it is God's eternal goodness that offers it. As Richard Rohr so eloquently states, "We are not loved because we are good; we are loved because God is good." Our hearts ache for this good news, for this release; but our heads try to analyze it and rationalize it.

No word is more beloved in the Christian faith than "grace." And yet no word is more misunderstood and


