e miss the point of the Beatitudes if we do not see that they are the blueprints of Jesus' life. He was not merely a great teacher bringing a radical new truth. He lived the truth. He showed us the complete extent of what a person could be. He said, "Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness' sake, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven." He ushered in

God's new Kingdom through his agony and suffering on the cross.

All eight Beatitudes were on display during his fateful hours on Calvary's mount. He emptied his God-given powers to submit to the humiliation and pain. He did not respond to those mocking and cursing him, except to offer

Thrive Program Embraces Kids with Additional Needs

place to belong. That's something all of us are searching for. A place to belong at work. A place to belong among friends. A place to belong at church. But, for newcomers, it can be difficult to find a place to fit in... and it can be especially

intimidating for those with additional needs.

Research shows that many parents of children with special needs often feel that their child is excluded – even in a church setting. According to Church4EveryChild, associated with Key Ministry, "nearly 50% (46.6%) of special needs parents said they refrained from participating in a religious activity because their child was not included or welcomed" and "almost 1/3 (32.3%) of the special needs families who did try church said they had left at least one church because their child was not included or welcomed."

Ministry leaders at White's Chapel want to help change

"The very first Easter taught us this: that life never ends and love never dies." — Kate McGahan



ere we are again: just hours away from one of the biggest weekends in the yearly life of the church, just inches away from the glorious news of Jesus' resurrection with all its promises of new life and new possibilities - and in the midst of loss and uncertainty and grief, isn't that the news we need? Here we are: on the brink of our annual reminder of the extraordinary power of God. Yet, for many of us, we're not quite sure what this story has to do with us. We don't feel any different. We still hurt and ache in places and in ways we don't talk about. We still harbor resentment and mistrust; we still feel the stabbing pangs of guilt from yesterday's mistakes, and we don't think tomorrow's "hallelujahs" will fix them...we're afraid they won't fix us.

But that's the thing about Easter: it's for people exactly like us. It's for those of us who are broken, for those of us who mourn. It's for those of us who've been hurt and disappointed. It's for we, sinners, who need something more than an empty promise; it's for us who need an empty tomb. For this weekend, we will come together with thousands of others who are looking for something more, with men and women who are hoping that maybe something will happen, that maybe life can swallow death and joy will overcome defeat. We will gather with our brothers and sisters and, together, we will lift our songs with the prayer that the dimming embers of our faith might be rekindled.

I know I've shared it before, but I love what D.L. Moody once said: "We are told to let our light shine; and if it does, we won't need to tell anybody it does. Lighthouses don't fire cannons to call attention to their shining – they just shine." This weekend, we are called to shine. We are called to reflect the radiant beauty of God's love into the world around us. And that's the point: we don't have to manufacture the light; we don't have to manufacture forgiveness or mercy or grace: we simply have to receive it and, then, reflect it.

It is our hope, then, that even right now you'd pause for just a moment to lift up this weekend's services in prayer. Pray that all those who join us (whether in person or online) would experience the love of God and the grace of the Savior. Pray that we might all find ourselves refreshed and renewed, that the resurrection might happen in us. Pray that those to whom Jesus is a stranger will find in Him hope and love and the truest of friends, that they might begin a lifelong journey of faith. Pray that those who may have wandered from the faith might come home. Pray, simply, that all of us would shine our light so that the world might know that Jesus is alive!

Hall, Room 3103, Adult Education Building that will address topics of listening, co-dependency, and addiction. Pastries, coffee, and lunch will be provided. The class is free.

The purpose of the training is to provide skills and tools to anyone who has been touched by addiction. The training/discussion will include instructive life stories, personal reflections, exercises, and self-help tests. For those who have loved ones or friends who struggle with addiction/recovery, this workshop will provide you with needed support.

"This workshop is available for everyone and anyone who is interested in learning about the connection that codependence has with addiction.," said Rev. Victor Resendiz, Chandler's Hope Director, who will facilitate the class with Shannon Luce.

The class will focus on the book, "Codependent No More" (revised

mercy. He offered peace to the soldiers carrying out the awful deed. In the purity of his sacrifice, we see God.

How can we ever grasp Christianity without experiencing the depths of this day? How can we ever face our own trials without a piercing awareness of our Savior's suffering?

The traditional Good Friday service begins with a silent procession and the presider prostrating before the altar. In this dramatic act, the worshippers are saying, "We have killed God's son." And we are all guilty. We have all killed that divine spark in one another - through a callous word, a harsh condemnation, or a heavy hand. We are all guilty of killing the Hope of the world. As the service continues, Psalm 22 is read: "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me? Why are you so far from helping me, from the words of my groaning?" With these verses, we remember Jesus' words from the cross, and we witness the full

Highlighted content will be taken from the book and reviewed together. Purchase of the book is not necessary, although it may be purchased on

Amazon. The training is dynamic and will include conversations as well as Q&A. Participants are welcome to include friends, family, or anyone who has been touched by addiction. Support will be found within this workshop.

"The book is a wonderful resource to learn all about the unhealthy characteristics of codependence," said Resendiz. "In the workshop, we will be highlighting important ways to recognize such characteristics and how to outgrow them."

Membership at White's Chapel is never a requirement at Chandler's Hope classes or events. All are welcome, but registration is strongly suggested.

The mission of Chandler's Hope is to provide resources and guidance to individuals or families that have a loved one struggling with addiction. The ministry's leadership team is available to accompany and to hold space for anyone looking in the direction of a consistent plan of recovery.

humanity of Christ. In this moment, He descended to the depths of human exile. And yet, that was not the end of the story.

Biblical scholar Kathy McGovern offers a fascinating interpretation of this passage. She writes, "After Jesus, in agony, calls out the beginning verse: 'My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?', some women 'standing at a distance' respond in synagoguestyle to his introduction by reciting the rest of it – all 31 verses, including the triumphant end, when the Suffering One proclaims that 'All will proclaim the Lord to generations still to come, his righteousness to a people yet unborn.' Jesus relied on 'those standing at a distance' to finish the psalm for him." And He still does. At his lowest moment, Jesus knew that, ultimately, it all ends well, as God had planned. That certainty is what we hold on to. When the hour of persecution comes, when we are reviled and attacked, when our worlds come undone, we know and we worship the God who has been there - a God who will finish our prayers for us!

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Waiting (Holy Saturday)

"I said to my soul, be still, and wait without hope, for hope would be hope for the wrong thing." – T. S. Eliot –

"Blessed are the persecuted," He had said. But where was the blessing? Where was the blessing in the shame? Where was the blessing in the scorn? Where was the blessing in the agony and torment and pain? He had promised more. He had promised goodness, but there was only pain. He had promised joy, but there was only sorrow. He had promised life, but there was only the fetid, rotten stink of Roman death that remained. And, with that, it was over. It was finished.

Love was dead. Hope was gone. Light extinguished by darkness.

But hope is born in darkness. Hope is revealed in pain. Hope is found when waiting gives way to sacred reign. And so, they waited – one excruciating moment bleeding into the next. They waited, and they remembered. They remembered how they'd slept whilst Jesus prayed. They remembered how they'd hidden while He was led away, how they had left him alone, forsaken, and abandoned. They couldn't shake the thoughts. They remembered the crowds, the whips, the nails. They remembered the cries, the quake, the veil. They remembered the echoes of who He was and of who they still needed Him to be.

There, in the shadow of his death, the disciples strained against their fearful numbness to remember the Savior's life. They strained to remember his words. They strained to remember his power, to remember his smile and his loving, healing touch. Together, they remembered the world they once felt so close to – lessons He never had the chance to teach and miracles He never had the chance to perform. They remembered a better vision of their world and a better version of themselves. They remembered moments that all seemed like distant, fading memories.

The Promise had been betrayed by cruel lies. And it was over. All they could do was wait. And hope. They could only hope for another miracle, hope for another chance, hope for a Hope that was greater than any they could imagine. In the dark silence of that day, all they could do was to wait and to hope that the sunrise would bring an echo of Life, a Blessing that not even death could not deny.

this by intentionally welcoming and encouraging people – no matter their age, ability, or situation. Anyone can belong here... and anyone can *Thrive* here.

Thrive is an additional needs ministry at WC that is committed to caring for and journeying with those who have varying social skills, emotional needs, sensory needs, cognitive abilities, and physical abilities. Regardless of age, diagnosis, or story, it is the church's mission to create awareness, provide accessibility, and

offer a space of true belonging for all people as they engage in their faith.

"We want to ensure that all children receive the support they need in a Sunday School classroom," shared Thrive Coordinator and WC Kids staff member Alyson Bator. "We want them to feel the love of Christ, and the love of our WC Kids staff."

Thanks to

God and loved by our WC Kids staff. God shows up and makes this happen each week."

"For me, it is as simple as seeing God through each kids' growth and improvement each week," Wilkie said, "[and] each of our Thrive kids realizing and being shown that they are loved and incredibly valuable."

On Saturday, April 6, Thrive kids will have the opportunity to gather for the first-ever Thrive family event - Grow in God. It is specially designed for anyone with additional needs. The event, offered from 10:30 a.m. to noon, will provide a space to build community with other families involved in Thrive. Participants can register online for the free event, and

dedicated leaders and volunteers, Thrive now includes about 15 families and it continues to see growth. The program has seen success with the new Reboot room, used on Sunday mornings, and the Thrive buddy program.

The Reboot room is a sensory room that has been open since last August. It is designed to help kids reset and regulate when other Sunday School classrooms are overwhelming. (See picture above.) At 11 a.m., a class is held in the Reboot room for children who may struggle in the typical classroom setting. Volunteers are currently needed to serve in this area.

For additional support, Thrive also offers a one-on-one buddy assistance program to kids who may benefit from it. Those enrolled in the Thrive program are paired with a high school or adult volunteer after filling out a short form about themselves.

"We are also always looking for volunteers (high school and up) to be paired with a Thrive kid," Bator said. "You do not need to be an expert in working with children with additional needs. You just need to have a big heart!"

Bator's background and degree in Special Education has been integral to the Thrive program and the volunteer training. While leaders are equipped to handle any challenging situations that may arise, Bator and Thrive assistant Mayson Wilkie regularly see positive interactions with everyone involved.

"I have seen God orchestrate buddy pairs, and watching the child connect with the buddy and build authentic relationships is absolutely beautiful to watch," Bator shared. "I also love watching many of our Thrive kids worship. Many are so joyful and come in with a heart that is ready to love God with all that they have... My goal each week is to make sure that all of the Thrive kids know that they are loved by newcomers are also welcome to attend.

"We would love for other families who have children with additional needs, who may not have heard of Thrive, to join as well," Bator said.

Bator hopes that the Thrive program will continue to grow, because she knows it is making a difference and providing a place for so many kids to belong.

"Being a parent to a child with disabilities has been the most spiritually transformative experience of my life," shared Alison Hamilton, a parent of a child in Thrive. "Getting to share our daughter with a church community who welcomes her, makes space for her, and supports her so she can be included with her peers is the biggest blessing for our family - and for those who encounter her. Elise gleefully shouts 'HI!' every Sunday as she enters the Rock, spreading her joy and excitement for worship at White's Chapel. Thanks to the common threads support group and Thrive buddy program, White's Chapel feels like home for our whole family, which can be really hard to find, so it is something we truly cherish."


