Arkansas to help rebuild and revitalize spaces in the community while sharing the love of Jesus Christ with those in a variety of need. Every year, leaders hear testimonies of transformed lives as a result of our young people giving up a week of their summer vacation to be the hands and feet of

"We don't typically get to see the students on Wednesday nights because they have their own space," shared WC worship leader Grace Zeller. "So this is a cool opportunity to get to come see them lead worship and how they do it, and it's authentic to them... They're going to be singing a few songs that we all know, and then they are going to sing some that they are going to introduce to us. It's also a communion Saturday. So, the kids will be leading us in communion, and that's really special."

"It's such a cool thing that White's Chapel is allowing the youth to be able to lead the service," Reagan Sparks shared. "I think that this opportunity is a great chance to see if ministry is something that you are interested in doing, and it's just a great chance to be able to share my faith and love for the Lord with those around me and in the church."

Charles Hinkel and Madeleine Brock, two high school juniors, will give the sermon. It will focus on searching for God during difficult situations and looking through a new lens to see Him more clearly. Both student leaders are excited to share their faith with the congregation.

"This opportunity means a lot to me because it's one of my first times where I really get to share in-depth the effects the gospel has had on me these past months, and it's so exciting to do something so big not just for WC Students but for the whole church as well," Charlie Hinkel shared. "Being able to share the wonder of God with everyone here is so important to me because White's Chapel has provided such an amazing community for me during every phase of my walk with Christ," Madeleine Brock said.


Rev. Sam Robbins, the usual preaching pastor for the Saturday night service, believes this will be a special service for both the students involved and the people in attendance.

Currently serving as the Assistant Conductor of the Fort Worth Symphony Orchestra appointed by Music Director Robert Spano, Fukumura is the Second Prize Winner of The Mahler Competition 2023 with the Bamberg Symphony and a three-time recipient of the Solti Foundation U.S. Career Assistance Award in 2021, 2022, and 2023.

Fukumura was recently named Music Director Finalist of the Illinois Symphony Orchestra and is engaged to guest conduct the ISO on two programs in the 23/24 season. Other recent highlights include international guest conducting debut with the Orquesta de Cámara de Bellas Artes in Mexico City and guest assisting the Houston Symphony and the Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra. He was also invited by the Berlin Philharmonic as one of 10 assistant conductor candidates for Kirill Petrenko and the Siemens Conductors Scholarship. Active as both conductor and assistant. Fukumura has worked with esteemed artists such as Edo de Waart, Juraj Valčuha, and Dame Jane Glover, as well as Thomas Hampson, Yefim Bronfman, Yo-Yo Ma, and Gil Shaham.

The concert begins at 6 p.m. on Sunday, April 14 in the White's Chapel Sanctuary.

money for student missions, past golfers (and student volunteers) have spoken about meeting new people and enjoying the fellowship at the event. So, anyone looking to find a bit of community is encouraged to attend. For folks who also enjoy a little competition, there will be some prizes awarded as well.

"It's also fun because it allows our kids to get around people who they might not necessarily cross paths with, because our students will volunteer on the day of the tournament and they try to get sponsorships for the tournament as well," shared WC Students Co-Director Floyd Joseph. "They get to be around these adults, while they are [at the golf tournament], whose kids are all grown or whose kids are young – and they get to meet these kids and be around these students... so that's kind of cool that people can interact with others in our church who you wouldn't normally run into. So, I really like that part of it."

"So, that kind of stuff makes for really sweet community when we come out of mission trip, both middle and high school, but it's also a chance for them to get outside of themselves and see what God is doing in other places... and see how they can be lights to people who don't have a lot of hope. We can come in, and just by doing small little projects, we can help show more than just these little projects, but we can show them Jesus. It's a cool experience to be a part of mission trip."



the last few years, Cocco has been dedicated to paint in a new artistic style he created and calls sacrocubism, which portrays sacred and religious events in a style of painting with features of the postcubist art movement.

Born in 1936, the artist is self-taught with international recognition, having his original works displayed in museums and art galleries in his native Argentina, as well as France, Japan, Mexico, Spain, Uruguay, and the United States. He has also been featured in United Kingdom's Royal Mail special edition of Christmas stamps in 2021, having been commissioned to create a series of stamps by Queen

Elizabeth. In addition to churches, his work has been featured in museums, government buildings, and universities. Cocco was born in Concepción del Uruguay, in the Entre Ríos province of Argentina. He was attracted to art from his earliest memories. His mother said that as a young child, he would sleep with a pencil in his hand and by morning his bedding would be covered with pencil markings.

Jorge Cocco won his first citywide art award at the age of 9. In his early 20s

he had gained State level prizes and recognition. He continued his art career in Buenos Aires, and in 1976, he moved to Spain. Despite being a newcomer to Spain, Cocco rapidly integrated in the art community with exhibits in Ibiza, Valencia, and Bilbao, among other cities. Soon, museums started acquiring original Cocco's for their own collections. While sojourning in his artistic path, Cocco continued learning and experimenting, traveling through Europe where he would spend countless hours observing the old masterpieces at the most important museums.

In 1983, he moved to Mexico where he was able to learn more about and be in close contact with the cultures of Ancient America which played an influential role in his art. While in Puebla, Mexico, Cocco was a professor and head of the art department at the Universidad de las Américas. He moved back to Argentina in 1991, where he started art schools, taught at different institutions and wrote several articles and textbooks about art.

Cocco has continued creating new art and exploring new frontiers of expression throughout his long career.

"I think this is a terrific show and has been very well received as he has a large following," said Wyatt.

The gallery is located on the southwest side of the Sanctuary entrance. The exhibit will be featured through May.

people are applying for assistance.

As a reminder, last year, a fire temporarily closed the donation station. Damages were assessed at \$75,000, affecting portable buildings, a shipping/ storage container, and bins at the donation center.

The organization, which provides services and more to local families in need, worked for two months to get back on their feet. While everything is back to normal, they remain haunted at what was lost.

Organized in 1987 as a response to the growing need for emergency assistance services in far northeast Tarrant County, GRACE demonstrates compassion for those less fortunate by providing assistance to individuals and families in crisis and guidance toward selfsufficiency. Local churches responded

to community needs with a plan for distributing available resources through Grapevine's Ministerial Alliance.

GRACE continues to be a centralized, coordinated effort of churches, businesses and individuals donating food, clothing, monetary donations, and even professional services to Grapevine, Colleyville, and Southlake residents, as well as homeless and transient families in need. Programs have grown to include low cost medical services, transitional housing, and general emergency assistance-such as food, clothing, furniture, financial assistance, information and referrals.

While many other agencies donate various diverse food items, White's Chapel has been tasked with a specific basic food need. Sunday's communion offering will be dedicated once again to providing milk for the community organization. All the money received in this offering will go toward this very needed food staple.
