The MCC, or the
Methodist Collegiate Church is a
new Methodist denomination being
spearheaded by White's Chapel. The
denomination is in its infancy, and the
conference was the first time of reporting
regarding the progress that has taken
place.



The Conference was attended by representatives of the current member churches, which include Becker Methodist in Kemp, Dr. Jim Collingsworth, pastor; Community of Hope in Mansfield, Rev. Zach Stiefel, pastor; Good News Methodist in Leander, Rev. Trevor Kennedy, pastor; and White's Chapel Methodist, Dr. Todd Renner, Senior Pastor.

Conference Commission of Ministry
Chairman Rev. Jon Reeves reported on
new Clergy candidates and applicants
and the process required for licensing
and ordination credentials. Commission
members Dr. Judy Hunt, Rev. Trevor
Kennedy, Reeves, Dr. Todd Renner, Rev.
Joy Roberson, Rev. Zach Stiefel were the
Clergy Representatives, while Elizabeth
Hearn, Mike Kopesec, and Bob McMillan
represented laity.

Cantaré is a unique youth community choir that includes a broad range of participants, with varying musical backgrounds, the opportunity to create exceptional music experiences together.


They are an auditioned group of dedicated singers that meet each Tuesday evening in the choir room at

Stephen Ministry at White's Chapel Methodist Church is part of an international ministry dedicated to providing on-going and one on one Christian care in an individualized setting. Since the first White's Chapel first Stephen Ministers were commissioned in 1999, over 130 lay people have been

trained in the Stephen Ministry way of providing distinctively Christian care to people in need. Today, we have 34 Stephen Ministers who provide care to our Care Receivers both from our church and the community. White's Chapel is one of over 13,000 U.S. and international congregations that have established Stephen Ministry programs, including about 1,000 in Texas. The focus of the

program is to walk beside an individual

and offer listening skills, prayer, and time. Stephen Ministers are from all backgrounds, life experiences, and faith journeys but share a common trait – the desire to be a conduit for Christ's love in a special caring relationship. The journey for many has been challenging and life

#### The Patient Lessons of Spring...

"God, where

are You? Have

You forgotten

me completely?

Are you mad?

Do you care?"

"I feel the forest breathing and hear the slow, inexorable growth of the wood." – Giuseppe Penone –

n recent weeks, more than at any other time in my ministry, I've sat with folks and with families facing overwhelming doubts, and I've had to remind them of the uncomfortable truth that the true life of faith is not for the faint of heart. It's not for the timid or the cautious. It's not for the lazy or lethargic.

It's not the easy path that too many have assumed it to be, for it leaves no room for apathy or indifference or self-concern. The uncomfortable truth is that the path of real faith – undefeated faith leads to a rugged and splintered cross. It leads to an anguished soul and to a sorrowful heart, to more questions than answers, and to the incredible Mystery of God. This type

of faith - this selfless and sacrificial faith – is rare. It's hard. And it requires much more of us then we want to give...more than we think is actually possible. So, it's easy to understand why so many of us don't try. In the face of such staggering odds, it's almost commonsensical to give up, to put our lives of faith on autopilot, and to let them take care of themselves.

There, we satisfy ourselves with all of the outer trappings of what we think "faith" is supposed to look like but none of the dearest and deepest elements of what it really is. We settle for going to church and trying to make the right choices (most of the time). We open ourselves up in small ways to being formed by faith's subtle hands: we allow ourselves to be informed by faith, but we pull short of letting ourselves be fully transformed by it. We fear the anguish of

being wrong...or, maybe worse, of being right: that faith demands a trust that

It is the plea of the Psalmist. In Psalm 13, we hear him cry out like we've cried countless times: "God, where are You? Have You forgotten me completely? Are you mad? Do you care?" In that unnerving place where God is silent and where prayers seem to go unheard, the Psalmist calls out. He refuses to give up. He refuses to be defeated. He wants to go deeper; in fact, he needs to go

> deeper. He needs that place of transformation. But transformation takes time. And it takes trust, for it is a rigorous, timeconsuming, life-consuming process of tending the fertile soil of our souls. It's waiting and watching and doing what we can – all that we can but only what we can. Like the flowers that are just now emerging from their winter slumber, God's work requires

patience and devotion, for the first sprouts of growth that break free from the parched ground of our lives creep slowly into the Son's light.

Deep beneath the surface, though, we must know, we must trust that the roots of love and gentleness, of hope and joy and peace are tapping into the rich springs of God's goodness - even when God feels a million miles away. Sure, there may be few outward signs of growth, and it can be a frustratingly tedious journey; but even then – especially then - we must continue to water the fragile seedlings of our faith. We need to bathe them with prayer and with worship, with silence and patience and gratitude. We need to "feel the forest breathing" and hear the growth of the wood – trusting in God's faithful provision and his unfailing love.

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## The April Garden

Spring is finally evident as daffodils and flowering trees start to bloom. Expect the inevitable April showers this month but with sunny days too, when you can turn your attention to the lawn.

It's an exciting month, with indoor-sown seeds well into growth, and it's also time to start sowing outdoors. Just watch out for frosts...

#### Plant Tender Bulbs in April

In frost-free regions, plant bulbs such as caladium, tuberous begonia, and canna directly in the garden in April. Tip: Plant tuberous begonia and caladium bulbs with their rounded side down. New growth emerges from the top (concave) side of the bulbs.

#### **Select Perennial Herbs**

Thyme, lavender, oregano, chives, mint, and sage are perennial herbs that can be planted in April gardens. They require a sunny spot that receives at least six to eight hours of direct sunlight a day. If you have heavy, clay soil, mix in sand and compost at planting time to improve drainage. Herbs will not thrive in wet, mucky soil. Some herbs, such as mint and thyme, are available in a wide range of flavors and scents. Do some research before you plant to customize your herb garden to your own personal taste.

#### Improve Lawns in April

Fix bare spots in your lawn now. Rake the area to remove dead grass or other debris. Then, seed with Kentucky bluegrass, perennial ryegrass, or creeping red fescue. To help germination, barely cover the seed with soil and tamp gently. Water daily until the seed germinates. Be sure to read the label before you purchase grass seed. Look for mixes that contain less than one percent of "wo or "crop" seeds. Also, never purchase grass seed that has less than a 70 percent

germination rate

listed on the label.

Bare-root and container-grown roses can be planted in April gardens. For great color and easy care, select landscape varieties such as Knock Out. These tough-as-nails roses offer almost continuous bloom. Plus they look great paired with perennials such as black-eyed Susan, Russian sage, and catmint. Select a location that receives at least six hours of direct sunlight a day. Landscape roses such as Knock Out look best planted in clumps of three or more. Repeat at intervals scattered through your garden.

#### **Monitor Rainfall**

If you don't have a rain gauge, add one to your garden in April. For optimum growth, most plants require about an inch of moisture a week. With a rain gauge, you can track rainfall and apply



additional moisture as needed. This saves money and conserves water.

Place your rain gauge in an open area where it won't be affected by tall trees or buildings. Be sure

to empty it after every rain to ensure accurate measurements and to prevent mosquitoes from breeding in the standing water.

#### **Prune Spring-Flowering Bulbs**

As daffodils, hyacinths, and tulips fade, clip off their flower stalks. This encourages the plants to store energy in their bulbs instead of setting seed. Just be sure to leave the foliage alone until it fades naturally. The plant needs the leaves to make energy for next year's flowers. To camouflage bulb foliage,

> interplant annual flowers around the bulbs. By the time the bulbs die back completely the annuals will have carpeted the area with bloom.

#### **Add Birdhouses**

If you haven't done so already, set out birdhouses

designed for songbirds such as bluebirds, wrens, purple martens, and chickadees. Nesting songbirds will devour pesky insects that would otherwise feast on you or your garden. Select birdhouses designed with the appropriately sized entrance hole for the species you want to attract. Avoid birdhouses with perches; birds don't use them, but predators do. Do some research before you install a birdhouse to be sure you are mounting it at the correct height and location.

#### Replace Annuals

In frost-free regions, such as southern California and Texas, replace coolweather annuals, such as pansy, snapdragon, and primula in April gardens with heat-loving cosmos, verbena, vinca, salvia, petunia, sunflower, and zinnia. When purchasing annuals, look for short, stocky plants with rich, green foliage. Often, those that aren't blooming yet are the best choice. Avoid leggy or wilted plants.

#### **Move Houseplants**

As soon as frost danger has passed, give your houseplants a vacation outdoors. Move them to a shady spot in your backyard where they are protected from high winds. Check them daily and gradually move sun-lovers such as succulents or hibiscus to a brighter location. Most houseplants respond

quickly with a burst of new growth. Once outdoors, feed houseplants with a dilute solution of liquid fertilizer every time you water.

Because the plants will be in active growth, they will appreciate being fed.





to work together," said MCC Dean, Dr. John McKellar. "Because of the nature of establishing the groundwork for a new denomination the process has been slow."

Over 7,600 churches have disaffiliated from the United Methodist Church over the past three years. Approximately 3,000 of those churches did so with the intent of joining the already established Global Methodist Church.

"About 4,600 churches have become independent entities," said McKellar. "But Methodists have connection in our DNA. We seek to bring different groups of Methodists together. We want to figure out how to be the bridgebuilders."

McKellar explained that because of the heartache experienced by many of these churches through the disaffiliation process, there remains a level of hesitation and mistrust.

"These are the people we hope to reach," he said. "The job is going to be hard, but it is our goal to focus on what unites us and not what divides us. I remain proud of the sense of connectionalism we are building in spite of the fact that the MCC has no staff and requires no apportionments. We exist to do ministry."

There was much to celebrate. New church starts include LaMesa ("The Table") Methodist church in east Fort Worth and Good News Methodist, Georgetown.

LaMesa, which is being led by Rev.
Jesus and Lily Molina, is adjacent to the White's Chapel Dental Clinic. Rev. Victor Resendez is liason to that community.
Good News, led by Rev. Trevor Kennedy, is a new campus planted in Georgetown, Texas, which was recently hailed as the fastest growing community in the United States.

Additionally, the addition of the Kenya Conference was celebrated with a report on the mission work there by Bishop Joe Kamau. Over 60 churches have joined the MCC in various regions of Africa.

Current negotiations are in process with churches in Texas and Louisiana. In closing, McKellar cited 1

Thessalonians 5:9-11:

"For God has destined us not for wrath but for obtaining salvation through our Lord Jesus Christ, who died for us, so that whether we are awake or asleep we may live with him. Therefore encourage one another and build up each other, as indeed you are doing."


